


Village Passes First Fire Ordinance

#### THE XENIA TORCHLIGHT

**Yellow Springs Town Council Meeting** 

The town council, with a view to the prevention fearful destruction of property by fire, to extinguishing the vast sheets of flame, to the saving of thousands dollars worth property to the citizens, purchased, one day last ofweek. six the "Gardener Fire Extinguishers" for the infinitesimal sum of \$275. This is only a beginning in the right direction. O city fathers, in your infinite wisdom why don't your hearken unto the voice of a united Called people! by Providence to guard the best interest of this village, why don't you do it in such a manner as becomes your exalted stations. 'Tis humble petition of an outraged people that you "do the right thing at the right time," namely, create and organize a competent and sufficient fire department, not a niggardly one. It is the people's money you are chosen to control, and they demand that you use their thousands in the purchase of cisterns and fire engines, and everything belonging thereto. and their blessing will go with you now and forever henceforth and hereafter.

# MIDNIGHT BLAZE GREAT FIRE AT YELLOW SPRINGS

Nine or Ten Buildings Completely Destroyed, With a Loss of \$50,000 Worth of Property

The little city of Yellow Springs ex-

perienced a large and destructive fire at an early hour this morning. Being without any fire department whatever, even a bucket brigade, they had to call on Xenia for help and by the time our department could get there the

flames had marked a whole block of buildings for destruction.


The greatest conflagration that even visited Yellow Springs came

in devastating fury, on last Monday, leaving in its track a desolated mass ruins, blackened of chimney stacks, gaunt ghost of trees, stripped of the fresh tender foliage of Spring, and yawning holes filled with twisted and seared iron roofing and heaps of smoldering ashes to mark the place where a whole block of buildings which had stood as monuments of local enterprise and progress; changing in a twinkling and for all time, the whole appearance of the village as she used to be, but never will be again.



View from Short St. looking toward Xenia Ave at the site of the Tavern



Yellow Springs was again visited by a bad fire Sunday morning and as a consequence of

neglect to heed warnings to procure some sort of fire apparatus, the town sustained another heavy loss and the unprogressive and stingy people of the town who have succeeded in defeating the movement for better fire protection are being roundly roasted as THE SUN found out on a visit to the scene of the conflagration yesterday.

Just eight months ago the Little grain elevator and several other buildings were consumed by a fire at a loss of \$12,000. About five months ago the portion of lying Xenia avenue probably 300 feet south from the post office was destroyed at a loss of about \$10,000 and yet the town is not protected by fire apparatus of kind, save several sections of lawn hose that be attached to any force pumps.

# OUR NEW FIRE DEPARTMENT

At last Yellow Springs is to have a fire company. Owing to the attempts to burn the Schlientz elevator and the common need of one, steps were taken last Monday evening by a number of persons to organize a company. A meeting was called at the Mayor's office and with the Mayor as chairman a committee was appointed to draft a constitution.


It is the purpose of the new company to equip the engine and repair the apparatus in general.

Council has proposed to furnish rubber coats and lend any assistance to make the fire protection better.

That this is a move in the right direction no one doubts and it is hoped that a first class company can be organized.




